Drop-In 'Listen and Learn' Sessions

It was a pleasure to be joined by different parents and family members at Tuesday's 'Listen and Learn sessions.' These are such valuable sessions for me, as a Headteacher, as your feedback helps to shape and guide practices in school. During the meeting, the following points were discussed:

School Trips and Residentials—There was a general consensus that parents would be happy for the school to host more school trips, and residential visits to begin in Year 4. There was, however, an acknowledgement that trip costs are continuing to rise and could impact families with more than one child. Parents suggested a payment plan scheme to spread costs but were grateful for the advance notice that school gives. Action: Mr Day will carry out a wider consultation in the spring term to ensure all families are able to access trips, without financial burden.

Swimming Year 5—A parent queried why children who were proficient in swimming 25m did not have to attend swimming in the autumn term. Mr Day explained that school's priority must be to ensure as many children as possible can swim their basic entitlement so as to reduce risk of drowning. Children who had not achieved this in Years 5 and 6 were therefore prioritised for swimming lessons. Children who have already attained 25m will attend additional swimming lessons in the spring term.

Relish Platforms—Parents shared that the Relish platform is complicated, cumbersome and that photos of food items can be misleading. Parents also raised that, on occasions, children have not been given their preferred menu option. Action: Mr Day to feed this back to the kitchen team and central catering team at the earliest convenience.

Here is to a prosperous and rewarding year ahead.


